Abstract

THE LEGAL FRAMEWORK FOR SEX EDUCATION IN ENGLAND

- LEGISLATION IN THE 1980S AND 1990S -

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The purpose of this paper is to explain the current legal framework for sex education in England by tracing the way it has developed. An analysis is made of the various official documents which have led to the present position.

It can be shown that this process has resulted in a situation in which school sex education is divided into its biological aspect - which is taught to all pupils as a part of the Science National Curriculum - and its personal and social aspects - which are taught in other subjects and on other occasions at school. Parents are permitted to withdraw their children from any aspect of a school's sex education programme except for the biological aspects covered in the Science National Curriculum.

The current position with regard to school sex education in England mirrors social trends that have taken place in England over the last twenty or more years. This paper concentrates on legislative aspects but will be followed by others in which a detailed analysis of the social background to this legislation is analysed.
